



the school community of St. Augustine's College.










Year Twelve Orientation Camp And Retreat

During 1979, a new venture for year twelve students was instituted. Besides attending a retreat, the students also participated in an Orientation Camp.

The purposes of the camp, held at the Crusader Union Centre at Galston, was to give the year 12 students an opportunity to set their sights for the year in relation to study, school leadership, extracurricular activities, their relationship to the staff and to one another.

They would elect the Captain of the School, the Vice-Captain and the Prefects for the year, and map out a programme of involvement within the school.

The school constitution was examined, and necessary alterations made at several long meetings. Topics for discussion including the organization of social life and study and the expectations of the staff for year twelve were also raised.

Towards the end of the camp, after the discussions concerning leadership responsibility and the role of the prefecture had been completed, elections for Captain, Vice Captain and Prefects were held. The elections for members of the various College committees and councils were also held, including the elections for the Arts Council, Social Council, Sports Council and Common Room committee.

The experience was considered a resounding success by all participants, staff and students, and the camp looks to become an annual event.

In both 1978 and 1979, the twelfth year attended retreats. The retreat, in the religious sense, is an occasion of contemplation; to go to a place apart from the normal everyday scene and to take stock of the type of life we are leading. It is an examination of this life, in light of it as an act of witness to Christ in the presence of God, and of one another.

In both of these two years, the year twelve classes took this opportunity.

Fathers John Claskon and Brendan Quirke conducted the retreats. The experience was something new to the students.

Our hope is that the retreats have achieved their aim, and that they have possibly helped each individual to set himself realistic goals in relation to his maker, and also to his neighbour.

For some people, the retreat can be a profound experience leading to life-decisions.

During April of 1979, students from St. Augustine's together with students from Stella Maris combined to produce Gilbert and Sullivan's "Trial by Jury", the first successful Opera written by the duo

Rehearsals lasted for two months, and were continued through the College music camp which took place in May. The efforts of those involved in the production culminated in two performances of the work in June, presented at the

auditorium of Narrabeen High School.

Briefly, the story concerns the farcical trial of a breach of promise case. The Defendant (Noel Debien) has jilted his ever loving, ever faithful bride (Kathy Randazzo). The bride, together with her counsel (Stephen Allen), is out to get as much money as she can from the object of her "blind adoration", and more unfortunately for the defendent the jurymen are swayed by the fair countenance of this jilted Helen, and are suitably vexed by the inconsiderate defendant, Edwin.

The case is eventually solved when the judge decides to marry the young maid himself, and Edwin is forced to pay

damages as well.

The work was directed by Mrs A. Sutcliffe, and other assistance covering all aspects of production came from



Miss L. Leak, Mrs M. Borger, Mr D. Ross, Miss R. McGrath, Mr L. Soloman and the many others who assisted with backstage affairs, lighting and sound.

The work constituted half of the programme of a musical concert which included performances from the choir, the college band and the primary musical groups.

During 1979, the Music department purchased a number of violins, and subsequently, students from the primary school have been taking lessons from Miss Leak, one of the music teachers at the school.

It is intended that the group will become the basis of

a string band in future years.

The group gave its first public performance at the primary music concert, which took place on All Saints Day, at St. Matthew's Hall in Manly. The group acquitted itself admirably at its first appearance in public, and shows much promise for the future. The medley of folk tunes played by the group were not excrutiating to listen to, as one would expect from a new group of violinists, but well played and in tune.






of practice each day.



WYNYARD TO PALM BEACH




The first of the two Wynyard to Palm Beach Walkathons was in 1978 when the students of the then year 10 walked 44 kn to raise \$1 500. The next year, over 100 students from years 10 and 11 walked the same distance, and on this occasion raised almost \$3 500.

The money was donated to the Prince of Wales Children's Hospital for use in the treatment of, and research into, leukaemia and cancer in children. The hospital has already used some of the money to purchase its first Overbed Laminar Unit, which provides pure air essential to children with low resistance to infection, and which therefore protects them from what could be a fatal illness. The next purchase will probably be a machine used for making blood cell counts.

Remedial Education at St. Augustine's

Beginnings

Students of St. Augustine's have had the opportunity to receive remedial help in English, especially in the area of Reading, for nearly four years now. Mid 1978 saw the beginning of remedial mathematics classes as well.

As far as numbers will allow, the boys are given individualized programmes in small groups of six to ten. The success of the programme is evident from the many positive comments received by both Mr Roberts and Mrs Gately from both teachers and parents. The improvements in the grades of the boys attending the lessons, improvements which occur over a period of time, are further proof of the success of the programme in aiding the boys to cope better with the workloads in both primary and seconday school. Indeed, there have been four boys from the 1979 year ten class, who attended remedial classes in year eight, invited to continue their studies in eleventh year.

The remedial department now occupies the whole of the Gulliver St. House, previously used for the teaching of Music. To meet Council requirements, the old house had to be brick veneered at the cost to the college of around


For improvements to the interior of the building, and to provide more and better teaching facilities, it has been decided to apply to the educational Grants Commission for monetary assistance.

We began in a humble way on a back verandah, with \$1 000 to spend on equipment. Now, thanks to the foresight of Fr. Burman, his understanding and encouragement we are in a position to help many more boys who might otherwise fall behind in literacy and numeracy.

Parental Involvement

One of the more important factors in the aiding of the reluctant or slow learner is parental participation. Both Mr Roberts and Mrs Gately regard this involvement as absolutely essential if the boys are to make progress. A close liaison between parent and teacher has been our aim in the past, and will continue with parental co-operation in the future.

Anyone wishing to inspect the remedial facilities being offered at the college may feel welcome to do so, but please make an appointment first by telephoning the College.

DRAMA

The last two years at St. Augustine's have seen both a higher standard and a greater volume of dramatic production.

By March 1978 rehearsals were well under way for the first major play at the College since "Maria Marten". The play was "David and Lisa" by James Reach. In the weeks leading up to the production in June, the school's general purpose room was transformed into a theatre containing over one hundred seats and the many sets required for the complexity of scenes during

"David and Lisa" is the story of David (Mark Hopkins), an only child who is overprotected and dominated by his mother (Jacki Neville). David is tortured by his fear of being touched, and when he arrives at Berkely School he meets Dr Anne Swinford (Regina McGrath) who tries desperately to soften his stern character. She introduces him to Lisa (Kerry Smythe), a waif who has developed a split personality. Their unusual friendship leads to a final reckoning of their seemingly ridiculous faults.

"David and Lisa" was assessed by the New South Wales Arts Council. The Council presented Mark Hopkins with the "Outstanding Achievement in Acting" award. The play, directed by Mr Les Solomon, drama teacher at the college, was so successful that a revival season was organized during 1978.

November of the same year saw the next dramatic output by St. Augustine's College. The same actors as appeared in "David and Lisa", along with many new arrivals to the stage produced an evening of shorter scenes concerning the journey of mankind. Man was seen as friend, deceiver, witness and preacher in both serious and comic roles. The drama experience was titled "A time for Man".

Those involved in the drama department at St. Augustines, joining with the Music Department succeeded in making 1979 one of the biggest years for some time. Together with the ladies from Stella Maris College, St. Augustine's produced the witty opera "Trial by Jury". The full report on "Trial by Jury" is

contained on pages twenty two and twenty three.



Less than two months later it was time for "Goodbye Mr Chips", probably the most ambitious, and subsequently most successful performance attempted by the drama department since Mr Solomon has been at the school in the capacity of drama teacher. A large cast, headed by Mark Hopkins (Mr Chips) and Kerry Smythe (Katherine Bridges) rehearsed for months to produce this three act epic. The story covers fiftyfive years and there are over twenty major characters. The play, replete with both comic and dramatic comment, was presented with a cast enthusiasm which conveyed itself into and throughout the audience. "Goodbye Mr Chips" was entered into the 1979 High Schools Drama Festival, which is organized by the Arts Council of New South Wales.

Although "Goodbye Mr Chips" was the last major production for the year, involvement in drama at the school continued. Many individuals and small groups have performed in Eisteddfods and films such as "Angry Young Man", "The

Awakening" and "All Roads Lead to Us".

The story of Drama at St. Augustine's in the late seventies is a story of success. Based on such a firm foundation, it appears that the eighties will be even better.










Two participants in the primary piggy-back race.




All Roads Lead to us

The name "Veritas" is derived from the school Motto "Vincit Veritas"; "Truth Conquers".








May we live through love in the service of God within the calling each of us has been given.


Extensions

Over the years 1978 and 1979, the College undertook an ambitious programme of extensions. Two stories were added above the library, and extra rooms added alongside the library (and continuing up over the three stories). The extra space gained was allocated to years eleven and twelve, and each story (year twelve and year eleven each using one floor) contains classrooms, a large common room, study rooms, conference rooms and counselling rooms. Both stories are fully carpeted, and the year twelve rooms have facilities for making coffee. Overall, the rooms are the most lavishly appointed in the college.


In all, \$400,000.00 was borrowed by the school to complete the project, and this sum included professional costs of \$33,000.00 and \$16,000.00 for furnishings. In order to cover this enormous expenditure, a fund raising scheme involving the parents and friends of the College was organized, and this raises around \$38,000 each year. The School is paying off the debt at the rate of \$59,100.00 each year for fifteen years, and it is only through the generous contribution of those involved in the fund raising scheme that the school can manage the debt.

The extensions to the library have been used to expand the library into a multi-media resource centre, and it stocks an enormous variety of cassettes, slide sets, videotapes and many other types of written and visual material.


Games were played at Balgowlah Boys High, and

It is interesting to note that many of the boys have gone on to represent Manly-Warringah and also the state in this sport, which is showing more and more promise for the College in the future.





By the time this yearbook is in the hands of its readers, students from the school will have completed over one hundred and fifty visits to the George Mockler Hostel and Charles O'Neill Homes at Mona Vale, which are under the care of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul.

The work there was commenced by the year 10M class of 1977, and year 10 students from subsequent years have become involved in the activity. Not a week has passed since the beginning of 1977 without some of our students going to the homes.

The following list gives some idea of the variety of the work undertaken by the boys; large areas of lawn are mowed regularly; many hundreds of barrow loads of clay and rock were removed to accomodate a new boiler; disused sewage pits have been filled with soil and refuse from gardens; drains have been cleared; trees have been lopped and gardens maintained; neglected areas have been reclaimed and grassed, and a wide range of odd jobs for the residents performed. In addition to this work, a number of students spent the time talking to the residents of the homes and Hostel.

There can be no doubt that the people of Mona Vale have benefited greatly from the practical concern of the boys, but benefit has also come to the many boys who have quietly, and on so many occasions, given expression to that faith of which the service of others is the very essence.

Towards the end of last year, frequent media reports of the terrible anguish of the people of Kampuchea served to disturb the World's complacency towards the suffering of our brothers and sisters in other parts of the world.

A day was set aside at the college for a Fast Day to raise money for the people of Kampuchea. A large proportion of the school community fasted from breakfast until dinner, and the school canteen remained open only to receive donations. Takings by the end of the day totalled \$400.00

At lunch time, a special assembly was held at which prayers

were said for all those who live in need.

Every Friday for the past year, small groups of boys from both primary and secondary have been visiting the Matthew Talbot Hostel for destitute men at Woolloomooloo. The group takes part in activities ranging from the preparation and organization of food, clothing and showers for the men to just spending time to just talk with them. As well as bringing happiness into the lives of the men, the visits have inspired a sense of Christian love and caring for fellow men.




advice and general comment.




